

Русский язык II: 2020-2021*

*** All matters pertaining to Covid-19 related procedures are coded in red. Please read these sections with particular care.**

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I. Русский язык II

Course Description: **Русский язык II** is a mixture of intense grammar, vocabulary, culture, and linguistics.

Objectives: Students will be able to communicate in about a variety of topics using the grammatical and linguistic skills acquired.

Text: All materials will be provided by the instructor.

Required Materials: **Black ink pen (several), single section notebook for assignments;** textbook provided and workbook provided!

II. Rules and Consequences

1. Treat the teacher and each other with courtesy. If someone is bothering you, write the teacher a note detailing the problem and he will take care of it. Cursing others and insubordination to the instructor will result in an immediate referral to SRC.

2. Be seated with your materials by the time the bell rings. If you are standing/not present when the bell rings, you will receive a total of two warnings in addition to this one. Afterwards you will be counted late and receive a partial grade reduction on the day's opening activity.

3. Due to the high probability of Covid-19 Infection, severe or fatal illness, there will be NO food or drink allowed in the classroom. Cell phone usage per the Mr. Kegel's instructions will be permitted for appropriate use in the classroom, e.g. accessing vocabulary lists, games, Canvas and for the photographing of assignments. If you choose to misuse your phones, Your grade WILL suffer. If I am subjected to loud cell phone usage, you will get one warning. After that, i will ask You to put Your phone away and You will not be able to access the work in class that day. Consequently, Your assignment may be turned in late, in which case, Your grade will suffer (see below)

4. DO NOT speak during individualized activities, quizzes, tests and lectures. After lecture, the instructor will be happy to answer your questions. Students who are disruptive will receive two warnings in addition to this one. Afterwards, they will receive a referral to SRC for classroom disruption.

5. Keep all school property clean and free of graffiti. Towards the end of class, we have been instructed to clean our individual sites. Please due a thorough job and dispose of the materials appropriately.

6. Masks will be required in the classroom unless otherwise specified. If You have a legitimate excuse (i.e. approved by our administration) not to wear a mask, i will need to see that. Students will need to limit as much as possible ANY physical contact with fellow students and to refrain from exchanging materials (cell phones, pencils, et al.) I realize this will be a challenge but this is a difficult time and we will need to put aside our egos if we are to continue having in person classes. I expect all of my students to show concern for each other, their families and for me.

III. Hall Passes

1. DO NOT request a pass during the first or last 10 minutes of class.

2. Take the individualized hall pass. When returning from restroom, dispose of so that You do not infect anyone with possible pathogens. (You do NOT need to ask permission to do this during the time permitted!)
3. Sign the washroom sign-out sheet in case you should accidentally lose the pass.
4. LIMIT yourself to 10 minutes maximum. DO NOT make a habit of using Dr. Kegel's class for regular washroom breaks!
5. If the pass is missing and you should have an emergency, sign the washroom sign-out sheet and indicate emergency. LIMIT yourself to one emergency per semester.
6. **BE SURE TO SANITIZE YOURSELF AND THE DOORKNOB BEFORE LEAVING AND AFTER RETURNING TO CLASS.**
7. Students with a medical problem requiring greater than usual use of the washroom should provide the instructor with a doctor's excuse.

IV. Preparedness

You are expected to come to class prepared each day. Being prepared means that you must have your notebook and writing utensils as well as any other materials or assignments that are due.

1. Formative Assessments: 40%

Class work consists of written assignments, workbook pages and projects.

Generally, I will go over certain select portions of our written assignments and workbook pages. Those that we do not cover will be subject to grading. If You are not satisfied with Your grade, you may redo the assignment within a 3-day window. I will always select the higher grade.

Due to the high probability of Covid-19 Infection, severe or fatal illness, I will not be collecting any written work. All work should be submitted to me via Canvas or, in the case of the workbooks, photographed and sent to me on the same site. In addition to being a safer venue, the copy of Your assignment will remain on Canvas in the event that You should lose the original.

2. Summative Assessments 60%

Short quizzes will be given an average of 1-2 times per week. You may retake these within a two-week window. Some of these will be oral.

Students will also take one or more comprehensive test during each nine week session.

3. Late Assignment Policy

Late work is ONLY accepted from students with an excused absence for the day they were absent. Students with an excused absence have one week from the day of their return to class to make up the assignment. After that date, the late assignment will go down one grade each day that it is not turned in. Missed quizzes should be taken as soon as the student returns. This may

be done during the first half hour of lunch OR during those make-up sessions scheduled by the teacher.

4. Tutoring

The instructor will make every effort to help students with individual questions during group activities. Be patient! There are many many more of You than of him. Tutoring follows lunch Mon. (Span. IV), Tues. (Span. II), Thurs. (Span. III) and Friday (Rus. I-II).

VIII: Permission to watch Russian Movies

Dear Family!

Congratulations on your son/daughter taking Russian. With the dramatic changes in the former Soviet Union, the Russian language is increasingly important. While employers are able to find speakers of Spanish and French to fill job positions, Russian speakers of English are much rarer and in greater demand. Colleges and universities look favorably on applicants who successfully complete a Russian course. The opportunities to use Russian as a spoken language are increasing. Flagler and Volusia counties both have large numbers of Russian speakers and businesses that cater to the local Russian population.

Russian I is an introduction to Russian language and culture while Russian II builds on the foundations of Russian I. Students will learn the alphabet, certain fundamental (survival) phrases and the beginnings of Russian grammar. They will also learn about everyday life in Russia, Russian history and literature. During the semester I may ask your student to prepare at home for a grade a Russian recipe. If you are able to spare the kitchen space and can help your son/daughter, it would be much appreciated and may even be an enjoyable experience for you.

During the semester, we watch several original films in Russian (usually with subtitles). These films are relevant to the material being taught. They are an excellent way of relaying the culture to the students who generally find them enjoyable. While none of the films are rated (Russia does not have a rating system), they are all considered family friendly (we would call them G films) and are extremely positive in the values they teach. HOWEVER, occasionally the subtitles translate a perfectly acceptable Russian term (for example, “nonsense”) with a more colorful English cuss word. It should also be noted that some Russian movies feature Russians drinking that classical Russian beverage, vodka. This is a fact of Russian culture and is not intended to be an endorsement of drinking in any way, shape or form.

If you will consent to your son/daughter watching these films, please sign the permission form below and have your son/daughter bring it to me as soon as possible. In the event that you do not give your permission, your son/daughter will not be obligated to watch any of the movies and an alternate activity will be provided.
